

Outdoor learning: created for students, by students

The hard work of one afterschool club is on track to impact hundreds of students at Gates Chili Middle School.

Spartans there have spent the last several months growing their love of learning and the environment through the design and construction of an outdoor learning space. This student-led project is being guided by members of the Outdoor Club, an opportunity that first began this past spring.

"It seemed like a fun experience to try," said club member Katelyn B.

As all scientists do, students began this project by conducting research on outdoor learning spaces. They quickly formed their mission: to provide a natural, inclusive space for students to be educated in all content areas, practice social-emotional learning, and have opportunities to manage and explore the space.

During the design phase, they began exploring the creation of a pollinator habitat to help rebuild declining pollinator



populations. Pollinators, such as bees, hummingbirds and beetles, help many flowering plants produce their seeds and thus, ensure the continued existence of millions of plant species, and in turn, of most animal species, including humans.

Students turned planning into action this summer when they began construction. Katelyn and others shared that "it was hard work, but it was also a lot of fun. I also learned a lot about like different pollinator plants and perennial flowers. It was really cool."

Once complete, the outdoor learning space will feature a large seating area with logs and a sun sail for outdoor lessons, a pollinator garden, and an herb and vegetable garden, all maintained by students in the Outdoor Club. Middle school teachers and Outdoor Club Co-advisors Dorothy Brenneis and Lisa Dorofy are excited about the far-reaching impact of this outdoor learning space in their school.

"Science classes can benefit from an outdoor classroom to conduct lessons about ecology, ecosystems, pollinators and more, but an outdoor learning space provides so much more than a space for science," said Brenneis.

"Other subject areas are already using the space," Dorofy continued. "English and art teachers plan to use it to switch up students' learning environment and as an inspiration for assignments; family and consumer science (FACS) classes will be able to use the vegetables and herbs grown here. The possibilities are endless."

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Together we teach and inspire excellence for all learners.

New substitute rates!

The Gates Chili Board of Education has approved an increase in daily rates for instructional substitutes. The new daily rates for substitutes are as follows:



- \$125 per day for days 1-40
- \$140 per day for days 41-60
- \$150 per day for days 61-90
- \$160 per day for days 91+

In addition, when an instructional substitute works 15 or more days consecutively filling in for the same instructional staff member, that substitute shall be entitled to \$200 per day for the duration of that assignment. This rate is applicable to building substitutes. Other notable increases include: Teaching Assistant substitutes at \$115 per day; Clerical substitutes at \$16 per hour; and Teacher/School Aide Substitutes at \$14.20 per hour.



GC students make history on new electric buses!



When the district's two new electric buses hit the road on the first day of school, some Gates Chili students made history, becoming the first students in upstate New York to ride an electric bus to school!

The district unveiled the two new electric school buses earlier this year. The zero-emissions school buses can go more than 100 miles per charge, and feature LED fixtures both inside and outside the bus. The district is in the process of purchasing three additional electric school buses with the assistance of grant funding from the New York State Energy Research and Development Authority (NYSERDA). The next of those buses is expected to arrive before the end of the calendar year.

Capital Project Update

More than 150 new parking spots are now available by use for students, staff and visitors to the district's main campus and Spartan Stadium! This lot is one of the final items remaining in the district's \$68 million capital project approved by voters in 2017.

The final component of that capital project is the completion of a professional learning center at the high school. With band and chorus both having received new instructional spaces as part of this project, crews are reworking the space that was once the high school band classroom to create the Gates Chili Professional Learning Center (GCPLC). When completed, the GCPLC will be utilized for staff training and development as well as Board of Education meetings.

Meanwhile, the capital project approved in February 2022 is now in the planning and design stage. Gates Chili faculty, staff and administrators have been meeting with architects and construction managers to discuss various programmatic and space needs related to the first phase of the project. The first phase includes redesigning the current administration building to become a UPK center, renovating the high school to house the administration building staff, new technology department learning spaces in the high school and middle school, new family and consumer science rooms at the high school and new music department spaces at the middle school. It is anticipated that work will begin in the spring or summer of 2024.

Student council provides opportunities

for student-led leadership throughout the building and in the Gates Chili school community. Advisors Sarah Amesbury, fourth-grade teacher, and Lauren Ewart, fifth-grade special education teacher, said having a student council that is reflective of the student body and inclusive for all students was a key focus for them. This year, they redesigned the application process to be inclusive for all students.

"Students had the choice of either completing a traditional paragraph or speech, making a short video explaining why they would be a good candidate, or drawing a poster to show why they'd be a great student council representative," they shared. "This process gave students who have a variety of skill sets the opportunity to participate."

The council meets monthly and focuses on leadership and listening to the needs and concerns of their fellow students.

"I am excited to be a member of student council because I want to make our school a better place," said Tim W., president of the Brasser Student Council. "We will work to be role models for our peers."

While they haven't voted on anything yet, the students are considering several projects, such as raising money for recess supplies, a pen-pal or buddy program with senior citizens, having a carwash to raise more money to provide healthy snacks for students who do not have them each day and more!

Dragons doing the math to support all **learners**

What do you get when you add together dedicated teachers and a consistent curriculum focused on building important math skills? The sum is students who are independent problem-solvers!



Staff at Gates Chili elementary schools are using the Everyday Mathematics program to build powerful mathematical thinkers. While this is the third year of implementation, it's the second year where all grade levels are utilizing this curriculum. The program was phased in with grades 2-5, then grades K-1. Everyday Math is formatted the same way across all grade levels, by using real-life examples, repeated exposures to mathematical concepts and multiple problem-solving strategies.

"The goal is to foster independent problem-solving skills," said Sara Mucino. "These skills are a critical foundation for students to use in applying to real-world scenarios."

At Walt Disney Elementary School, staff are using the data collected from student monitoring for continuous evaluation of their methods in order to support all students' individual needs. Teachers in each grade level meet regularly to identify obstacles to building independent problem-solving skills, then generate solutions to determine how to help all students achieve.

"Math instruction is not a one-size-fits-all formula." said Building Math Teacher Peter Sacheli. "Collecting data alone is not effective until we take action on it. These discussions offer teachers the time and guidance to make instructional decisions based on data that will improve student outcomes."

Everyday Math helps support families at home too. Parents/ guardians receive a message each time students begin a new unit. These messages offer descriptions of content and skills, vocabulary and definitions, do-anytime activities and how to support students with their homework.

Last spring, Neil Armstrong Elementary School fifth-graders, who are now GCMS sixth-graders, raised more than \$3,900 to fully-fund a rainwater collection system through the Ugandan Water Project. This local non-profit organization installs water catchment and purification systems in communities without consistent access to potable water.

The collection system sponsored by the students is now up and running, and according to the Ugandan Water Project, is providing clean water to 728 students and teachers at the St. Luke C/U Nyimbwa Primary School in the Central Region of Uganda. Previously, community members in that area traveled more than five miles round trip to get water from an off-site well. Kudos to these outstanding students for showing the Spartan Way and changing lives halfway around the world!

Nurturing the next generation of educators

A new club at Gates Chili High School is giving students the opportunity to explore a career path in education. The Future Educators Club (FEC) shows students behind the scenes of education and allows them to explore how the lessons they receive as students come to be, as teachers.

"I want to go into education because, I want to be a difference in a child's life," said Sadie B., GCHS student. "Many children have rough patches going into their young adult life, and I want to be seen as a teacher who can help the student through whatever they may be experiencing."

Members of FEC attend a seminar where they work on important skills like how interact with colleagues, solve problems and manage their work. They also work on a task related to shadowing a teacher. Then, the following week. students are immersed in a shadowing opportunity with a teacher who matches their content area of interest. There, they can learn more about the profession and even help facilitate activities in the



classroom. Being paired with a teacher in this capacity allows students to ask questions that they may not otherwise have thought of or felt comfortable asking during a typical day in the classroom.

"In the club, you get a real-life perspective on how teaching is in the environment you're surrounded in, you get to see the other side of what you've been a part of your entire life," Sadie explained. "It's interesting to see how different it is, and all the planning that goes into lessons."

For Gates Chili High School Spanish teacher Julie Gangai, participating in FEC as a teacher is an opportunity

to pull back the curtain on the parts of teaching that don't often get the

"It seems that the most challenging aspects of teaching are the ones that often end up on the news or being talked about on social media," Gangai said. "There are so many positive experiences that we have as educators that don't always get that same attention. Hopefully the students in this program will get to see a lot of the positive side and be encouraged to continue exploring this career path."

Right now, the club is made up of seven students shadowing seven teachers at the high school and middle school levels. As the program develops and grows, the district hopes to extend opportunities for students interested in elementary education to shadow teachers in grades K-5. In addition, the district is exploring ways to for students to be able to use this experience to earn work-based learning credit towards graduation.

GCHS to host ROC 2 Change **Summit this spring**

This spring, Gates Chili High School students will welcome hundreds of their regional peers for an annual event centered on combatting racism and fostering a culture of understanding and appreciation of



other cultures. Spartans involved in the Multicultural and International Club are working with their counterparts at Holley Central School District and Rochester City's School of the Arts to plan, co-host and organize the bi-annual ROC 2 Change Student Summit on Race on March 31, 2023.

Since 2016, more than 500 students have annually joined together for student summits on race to engage in a facilitated dialogue with peers and to address topics such as privilege, implicit bias, racial equity and social justice. The focus for spring's summit is Deconstructing Tolerance. Rebuilding Understanding.

Driver Education revs up for winter/spring session

The Gates Chili Driver Education program is getting ready to ride once again! A new session is set to start in January.

The popular course has been part of the district's Continuing Education program for decades and is offered twice a year: winter/spring and summer. Each session includes 16 lectures and 16 group road classes for a total of 32 hours of training. The curriculum covers everything from basic car control and maneuvers to buying and insuring a car and changing a tire. Program instructors Jon DelVecchio, Thomas Fasolt and Daniel Goodwin have more than 50 years of driver education experience combined.

"Our instructors are specifically trained to teach driving skills. The program is a huge help for parents stressing about teaching their children how to drive safely," said Director of Continuing Education Marla Chefalo.

History has its eyes on a whole new world at Gates Chili

Gates Chili students are not throwing away their shot at an authentic connection to the arts! In fact, they've never had a friend like ARTS Partners! The district is once again partnering with the Rochester Broadway

Theatre League (RBTL) for the national award-winning program, Arts Reaching and Teaching in Schools Partners.

The program provides students with arts integration in the classroom through connections to Broadway shows. This fall, the program gave high school and middle school students the opportunity to travel back to 1776 and connect with themes from, Hamilton, Lin-Manual Miranda's hit sung-and-rapped-through musical that chronicles the life of the founding fathers.

"We have been working on a storyboard and comparing the characters in the story, who are real characters from history," shared Semaj S., an eighth-grade student.

As part of the program, middle school students in grades 7-8 and high school students in grades 11-12 studied themes and concepts such as storytelling, seizing the moment and legacy. Students applied these themes to many assignments and projects in the classroom in subject areas such as social studies, English, art and music. Then in early November, more than 600 students, staff and family members had the opportunity to be in "The Room Where It Happens" for a performance of Hamilton at the Auditorium Theatre, where



seventh-grader Christian D. said he was "excited to see what the actors looked like and hear the songs that we talked about in class. We recognized the set when we walked in and it looks so realistic."

For sixth-graders, themes of kindness and paying it forward will also take center stage when they attend a performance of Come From Away, the remarkable true story of 7,000 stranded passengers and the small town in Newfoundland that welcomed them. Projects and assignments around these themes will take them "On the Bus" to the Auditorium Theatre in December.

Though it seems like "A Million Miles Away" right now, elementary students will be getting in on the arts integration fun, too. Students in grades 2-4 at all four elementary schools are participating in activities and lessons related to Aladdin before having the opportunity to attend a performance this spring. Themes such as being true to yourself, valuing what matters and a sense of freedom are helping students discover "A Whole New World" in the arts. The program will wrap up in May when high school English students "Get Down" with a curriculum connection to the Tony Award-winning

BUILDING A CHAMPIONSHIP CULTURE: Spartan sisters shatter diving records

They're Spartans, they're sisters, and now Heidi Tran and Kailey Tran are Gates Chili record-setters. In recent weeks. the two student-athletes have shattered decades-old diving records.

Breaking a school record is an incredible feat for any student-athlete, but even more impressive for the Tran sisters. who are new to the sport. Sophomore and former gymnast Heidi joined the swim team last year. When coaches saw her wearing a gymnastics shirt, they encouraged her to pursue diving too. Then after finding out that Heidi's sister was also a former gymnast, they encouraged Kailey to join this year's

After their first meet of the season, the sisters found out that they were close to beating the school's six-dive record. At the next meet, Kailey pulled it off, breaking the 41-year-old record with a score of 184.25. Two days later, Heidi beat Kailev's record with a score of 184.35. At the next meet, both sisters broke the record again, but Heidi held on to the honor with a score of 191.85.

The sisters went back and forth beating each other's six-dive record for the remainder of the season, with Kailev



going on to beat the 11-dive record, set by Rhyan Nolan in 2021, too. The original six-dive record was set in 1981 by Karen Bloechl, now Nowicki, who was a junior at the time. Nowicki still lives in the district and follows Spartan athletics.

"I've been teasing [current Gates Chili diving coach] Nancy [Sheridan] all this time that, 'Gee, she would have thought someone would have broken it by now. 41 years is a long time.' But it's so fun," said Nowicki. While Nowicki did not continue her diving career after high school, she said the skills she learned as a student-athlete have helped her throughout her life. Her advice to the sisters is to, "enjoy it while it lasts and take great pride in your accomplishments. Hopefully, your record will last for 40 years too."

While some might think the competition for the record might cause some tension between the sisters, they say that's not the case. In fact, they said, it's brought them closer together.

"We've always been not super competitive but kindly competitive. We goof around and it's not really about competition but performing together," said Heidi.

"We are always encouraging each other and are always proud of each other when the other one breaks the record because we're always trying to see who can break it first, and we're always just proud of the other one if they end up breaking our record," added Kailey.

At the end of the regular season, both sisters remain record holders. Heidi keeps the six-dive honor with a score of 207.45, and Kailev holds on to the 11dive record with 310.95 points.

Gates Chili hosts NYS Regent, unites for equity

Gates Chili staff members converged on the Gates Chili Performing Arts Center on Oct. 7 for the first Superintendent's Conference Day of the school year.

The day, aptly titled United in our Journey to Equity, included more than 800 staff members from across the district, including teachers, teacher aides, school nutrition workers, cleaners, clerical support staff, bus drivers and more. The morning kicked off with student performers singing the National Anthem and GCHS teacher aide and U.S. Navy Reservist Tiara Clark leading her fellow staff members in the Pledge of Allegiance.

Staff then participated in a keynote presentation by Regent Ruth Turner of the New York State Board of Regents. In addition to serving on the governing body of the state education department, Regent Turner is also a trained clinical social worker with many years of experience in public education. Her keynote presentation, titled "Courageous Conversations," encouraged staff members to look for ways to connect with students, families and their colleagues and to be vulnerable in order to have opportunity for authentic connection.

After the keynote presentation, staff members throughout the district continued their learning with an



extension activity around identity, as well as presentations about behavior support techniques to prevent crisis and responding to people with developmental disabilities and complex behavioral needs.

Hunter Youngblood Custodian Neil Armstrong **Elementary School**

"Once a Spartan, always a Spartan" is a phrase heard a lot at Gates Chili. For Hunter Youngblood, it rings true every day he comes to work as a custodian at Neil Armstrong Elementary School.

After graduating from Gates Chili High School in 2019, Youngblood began looking at ways to stay connected with his alma mater. His aunt, a Spartan bus driver, encouraged him to apply to work in the district and he soon became a bus monitor. Then, the pandemic hit. and buses weren't running as frequently. Having studied the Spartan Way values of respect, responsibility, compassion and hard work, Youngblood wanted to see how else he could help his fellow Spartans.

"The supervisor liked me, and he's like, 'why don't you think about moving over [to a building]? I like how you work. You're good, and I think I can use somebody like you," said Youngblood.

Youngblood has been at Armstrong as an employee ever since. Every day he comes to work with the intent to make sure that current students have a positive school experience just like he did.
