# Gates Chili budget not exceeding tax cap, despite rising costs

Dear Gates Chili Community,

As we begin to wrap up the spring semester, we are just months away from the start of the 2023-24 school year! As we reflect back on this school year, it gives us great pride to know all that our students and staff have accomplished thus far. Our Spartans have expanded their learning through new and existing opportunities unique to Gates Chili. We are also enjoying having more families and community members back on campus in person as they engage in the many activities and programs our district has to offer.

As we forge ahead into 2023-24, we will continue to advance learning through rigorous instruction, supporting students with what they need when they need it. This includes academic intervention and mental health services. Our proposed budget also supports a list of programs and services that are vital to our students' educational experience but are not deemed mandatory by the New York State Education Department (NYSED), including kindergarten, teacher aides, elementary school librarians, elementary art and music instruction, school plays/musicals, instrumental lessons, extracurricular clubs, grades 7-12 interscholastic athletics, intramurals, and dual-credit and advanced placement (AP) courses, to name a few.

We are in the midst of a difficult economic landscape this year, with costs rising in a number of areas including mandated wage increases, supplies and materials, and services.

While federal pandemic-relief funding has helped the district to enhance special education services and maintain staffing to provide reasonable class sizes, these relief funds are restricted and separate from revenues that support the general expenditure plan.

Therefore, to support the continued health, safety and education of all students, the Gates Chili Board of Education adopted a proposed spending plan for the 2023-24 school year of \$128,552,415 at its April 18 meeting. Under the proposed plan, the overall spending would increase by \$6,215,006, a 5.08% increase over the 2022-23 budget. However, it is important to note that the proposed tax levy increase is \$59,954,918, an approximate 2.99% increase, which does not exceed the tax cap.

This newsletter contains information about the 2023-24 budget on pages 2-5, information about candidates running for the Board of Education on pages 6-7, as well as many stories of the outstanding successes and opportunities available to our students and staff. Please review it ahead of the May 16 vote. On behalf of the Gates Chili Board of Education, faculty and staff, we thank you for your continued support.

# Three-Part Budget **Summary**

New York State requires school districts to present their budgets divided into three expenditure categories – administrative, program and capital.

#### Total Budget: \$128,552,415

**Administrative** 2022-23 2023-24 Amount \$13,667,845 \$12,032,572 **Percent of Budget** 10% 10%

Provides overall general support and management services including employee benefits for administrative and clerical support staff, costs for administration and supervision of each of the six schools, staff development, business operations and central administration.


**Program** 2022-23 2023-24 \$92,097,290 \$89,211,398 **Amount Percent of Budget** 73% 72%

Provides instruction and educational support services for the district's students. This includes the transportation costs, special education services and benefits for the instructional and non-instructional program staff.

Capital 2022-23 2023-24 **Amount** \$21,093,439 \$22,787,280 **Percent of Budget** 17% 18%

Provides maintenance and custodial services for six schools, the surrounding property, utility services, debt service payments and benefits for maintenance and custodial staff.

## What's on the ballot?

Residents will vote on the following propositions:

#### Proposition 1 – School Budget

The school budget proposition authorizes the Gates Chili Central School District to spend \$128,552,415 for school purposes during the 2023-24 fiscal year and to levy the necessary tax therefore.

#### Proposition 2 – Bus Purchases

This proposition authorizes the purchase of school buses at a total cost of no more than \$1,929,330. New York State reimburses Gates Chili approximately 75% of the cost of bus purchases.

#### Proposition 3 – Establishment of Capital Reserve Fund

This proposition authorizes the creation of a capital reserve fund to finance reconstruction and improvement of school buildings and facilities. This fund shall not exceed \$15,000,000 with a 10-year life.

#### Proposition 4 – Student Representative to the Board of Education

This proposition authorizes a student to serve as an ex officio student member of the Gates Chili Board of Education.

#### **Board Candidates**

Residents will vote to fill three Board of Education seats for three-year terms and one Board of Education seat for a one-year term. Candidates, in ballot order, are: Kathryn Davis (incumbent), Linda Palmer, Scott Bubel, Robert Long (incumbent), Catherine Coffee (incumbent), Michelle Jennings and Jahmar Elliott.

<sup>\*</sup> If a contingent budget is required, the Board of Education will review all areas of the budget to develop a contingency budget for the 2023-24 school year, pursuant to \$2023 of the Education Law. Should the 2023-24 budget be defeated, the following items may be deleted: equipment purchases, free public use of buildings, instructional and non-instructional positions, to be identified.

To authorize the school district to undertake the acquisition of school buses at an estimated net aggregate cost of \$1,929,330 after such tradein value, potential rebates, and/or incentives, and that such costs, or so much thereof as may be necessary, shall be raised by the levy of a tax to be collected in annual installments; and, in anticipation of such tax, debt obligations of the school district as may be necessary not to exceed \$1,929,330 shall be issued, or the school district may enter into an installment purchase contract if the board of education determines that it is in the best interest of the school district to finance the purchase in that method.

To authorize the establishment of a Capital Reserve Fund pursuant to §3651 of the Education Law, to be known as the "2023 Capital Reserve Fund," for the purpose of financing, in whole or in part, reconstruction and improvement of school buildings and facilities, and the acquisition of furnishings, equipment, machinery or apparatus; not to exceed \$15,000,000 with a 10-year life.

To authorize a student who is a senior and who has attended high school within the District for at least two (2) years serve as an ex officio student member of the Board of Education; being entitled to sit with Board of Education members at all public meetings of the Board of Education and participate in all Board of Education hearings and meetings, but not vote, attend executive session, and/or be entitled to receive compensation of any form for participating at Board of Education meetings.

The annual budget vote for the fiscal year 2023-24 by the qualified voters of the Gates Chili Central School District, Monroe County, New York, will be held on Tuesday, May 16, 2023 at the Gates Chili Field House, 1 Spartan Way, from 6:30 a.m. to 8:30 p.m. or by mail-in ballot. Mail-in ballots must be received by the district clerk no later than 5 p.m. on May 16 in order to be counted.

#### **STAR Exemption**

The School Tax Relief (STAR) program provides eligible homeowners in New York State with relief on their property taxes. Whether you receive the STAR exemption or the credit, there are two types of STAR benefits.

#### **Basic STAR**

- · Available for owner-occupied, primary residences
- Income limit for the Basic STAR credit is \$500,000 (the income limit for the Basic STAR exemption is \$250,000)
- Based on the first \$27,300 of the full value of a home

#### **Enhanced STAR**

- Provides an increased benefit for the primary residences of senior citizens (age 65 and older) with qualifying incomes:
  - o \$92,000 or less for the 2022 tax year
  - o \$93,200 or less for the 2023 tax year
- Based on the first \$74.070 of the full value of a home for the 2023-24 school year

## **Board of Education Candidates**

Four candidates will be elected to the board at the annual district vote on May 16, 2023. The three candidates with the highest number of votes will serve a three-year term from July 1, 2023 through June 30, 2026. The candidate with the fourth highest number of votes will serve a one-year term from May 17, 2023 through June 30, 2024. Below are statements provided by each candidate, in ballot order, about their experience and interest in serving on the board.



#### Kathryn (Katie) Davis


# **Board of Education Candidates (continued)**

# **Capital Project Update**

As the district finished one capital project, it is taking steps to prepare for the next. Phase one of the next construction project, which was approved by district voters in February 2022, is awaiting approval from the New York State Education Department (NYSED).

The first phase includes upgrades and renovations to high school and middle school technology classrooms, middle school music classrooms, and high school family and consumer science (FACS) classrooms to bring these spaces up to 21st-century standards. This phase also includes the relocation of district office staff to the high school due to the conversion of the Administration Building into a prekindergarten center. Once NYSED approves the plans and issues building permits for the work, which can take up to a year, the district will open up bidding so that contractors may submit proposals to complete the work. It is anticipated that construction would begin in the spring of 2024 and continue through the fall of 2025.

Meanwhile, planning meetings are underway for the second phase of the project. That phase mainly consists of work at Florence Brasser Elementary School and the construction of a multi-purpose field to the south of Gates Chili Middle School. At Brasser, work will be done to revise the bus loop and traffic pattern and create additional parking for staff and visitors, as well as improve safety, security and accessibility with the relocation of the main office and some classrooms.

At the middle school, the new turf field will be utilized for various sports including baseball, softball, lacrosse and soccer. Similar to Spartan Stadium, this field would provide students and student-athletes the opportunity to utilize fields regardless of weather conditions. With the construction of the multi-purpose field, there are also plans to create additional parking for staff and event attendees. As with other Gates Chili facilities, this space will be available for community group use.

#### **RETURN ON INVESTMENT**

#### **Facilities**

- Gates Chili facilities team members are on site from as early as 5 a.m. to as late as 11:30 p.m. to ensure facilities are clean, safe and ready for student and community
- Despite the mild winter this year, crews still used more than 345 tons of rock salt on parking lots and roadways and 800 bags of ice melt treating sidewalks and entryways to ensure safe conditions for students, staff and visitors to campus.
- As part of the district's energy conservation project, the middle school roof features a small section of solar panels to help offset the peak electric load for buildings on the main campus.

#### **Transportation**

- Gates Chili bus drivers are everywhere! They transport students to 82 different schools per day, including 234 trips in district and 147 trips to special education placements, private, charter or other schools.
- The district added three additional electric school buses this year, which will provide long-term cost savings to the district and contribute to a healthier school community.
- While not a requirement, by June 2023, all Gates Chili school buses will be equipped with seat belts thanks to the careful planning of bus purchases.



#### **Grades UPK-5**

- There's been an increase in clubs and extracurricular opportunities for students at the elementary level with more diverse options based on student interests such as kickball club, ukulele club, robotics, garden club and even Rubik's cube club!
- Elementary schools are working hard to re-engage families in the school community through a variety of events such as Elementary Football Night, Bingo Nights, Fall Festivals, Movie Nights, Art Shows and more!
- Gates Chili is gearing up to host its ninth year of Universal Prekindergarten (UPK), which provides 138 students with early literacy and math education through play.

#### **Library and Literacy**

- With 75+ library resources available, Gates Chili staff and students are on pace to use 81,791 print books, 4,914 audio and ebooks, 123,033 uses of digital databases and 10,912 hands-on maker experiences this school year.
- Kindergarten and firstgraders are getting ahead in reading by using decodable text sets that are focused on building knowledge and vocabulary.
- Gates Chili has been expanding literature selections to include authors from diverse backgrounds, such as author Kwame Alexander, who spoke to students in grades 6-8 virtually this fall about his career in writing.

# Traveling 'A Million Miles Away' without leaving school


Gates Chili's partnership with the Rochester Broadway Theatre League (RBTL) is helping students discover a whole new world through the arts!

The ARTS Partners program, now in its sixth year at Gates Chili, gives students the opportunity to see a Broadway show in person at the Auditorium Theatre. This year, students in grades 2-4 were set to take on the beloved classic "Aladdin," but long before buses were boarded and playbills were distributed, students explored Agrabah from the comfort of their classrooms as they studied the themes of the show.

Important themes like being true to yourself, valuing what matters and a sense of freedom were woven into activities throughout the second-, third- and fourthgrade curriculum. Students honed important literacy skills through lyric analysis, made critical connections to characters and their personality traits and, inspired by the genie's lamp, considered their wishes for the world.

After months of preparation, in mid-April, hundreds of students boarded buses and headed to the Auditorium Theatre to see the show in action. Even more magical, in the days following, cast members from the musical visited them for a special Q and A session at the Gates Chili Performing Arts Center (GCPAC).





# Elementary engineers at work

From crafting a structure that can withstand a natural disaster to using everyday materials to build a human hand with bones and tendons, Gates Chili elementary students are transforming into scientists at every grade level.

With the recent introduction of new state standards, Gates Chili is creating consistency across elementary schools and grade levels by using the BOCES 4 Science kits. The new kits help teachers tackle the three domains covered in the state standards: life science, physical science and earth/space science. Gates Chili is going one step further by offering its students additional activities tied to STEM. or science, technology, engineering and mathematics.



The materials in each STEM kit help teachers to create experiences that help students connect to the content in an authentic way. Using these kits, these STEM experiences allow all students the opportunity to design, create and learn through a hands-on experience. They collaboratively create a plan to build their structure, test it, and depending on the outcome, they might have to go back and redesign their structure. This inquiry-based approach is essential to help students develop critical-thinking and problem-solving skills. In Richelle Ritz's class at Florence Brasser Elementary School, kindergarteners recreated a scene from their favorite story using gears and blocks to bring the story to life.

"This gives students the chance to be a scientist; to design and engineer something and ultimately, problem solve to find a solution," said Ritz. "Students were also excited to share their learning with their families and show off their new problem-solving skills."

# Students take a STEP towards STEM

A partnership between Gates Chili and Monroe Community College (MCC) is helping to prepare students to take on STEM and health-related fields in college.

At Gates Chili Middle School, the STEP program focuses on strengthening

students' academic skills and test-taking abilities while bringing awareness to higher education and career opportunities related to these fields. Students in the program learn a wide array of technical knowledge using technologies that are not only important for their potential future, but also fun and engaging. A few recent examples at the middle school include 3D printing, robotics and even coding their own video game.

Even more important than the opportunities STEP brings is the support the program provides. Just like other clubs, groups or programs, STEP is an opportunity for students to find a group of people with whom they might have a lot in common. GCMS STEP Advisor Nicole Fedele said the program offers a level of mentorship that is hard to come by.



"Many students will drop by during the day or after school to get help with their homework, or just have a conversation about what is troubling them," said Fedele. "More than anything, the program is about instilling confidence in its members to pursue higher education and find their calling in the STEM world, as well as

helping them develop on a personal level."

Students in the STEP program also take part in important field trips to places including the Rochester Institute of Technology (RIT) and Code Ninjas, where students can create their own video games. The Summer Bridge program at MCC also allows students to continue their fun and learning during the summer months. In addition to helping students build knowledge, skills and confidence, it's also helping students foster a love for STEM.

"STEP has been a great opportunity for me," said Natalie Q., eighth-grader at GCMS. "I've made many friends, went on fun trips and learned new things to help me with my future."

Korean language students from the University of Rochester guided middle school students through various activities including learning the Korean alphabet, how to write their names in Korean, playing Korean school games and even trying Korean food such as Gimbap, Tteokbokki and others.

- Students in the 6:1:1 class at the middle school are utilizing a specially constructed apartment-like space in the school to hone important life skills such as laundry, cooking, cleaning, as well as simulated exchange of money and making purchases.
- Teachers are presenting rigorous instruction in a way that is relevant, helping students to be more engaged and connect learning to their own lives.



#### **World Languages**

- Gates Chili offers four languages at the middle and high school levels including, French, Italian, Latin and Spanish.
- Gates Chili Middle School now offers a specialized ENL program with intensive English literacy development support in content area subjects such as math, English language arts (ELA) and social studies.
- Registration forms for new students and some recruitment materials for prospective staff members are now available in multiple languages.



#### Grades 9-12

- The high school led its first-ever schoolwide book club study of Elizabeth Acevedo's "Clap When You Land" with 250+ students and staff participating!
- Students studied curriculum and themes related to "Hamilton" before attending a live performance of the musical at the Auditorium Theatre in November, meanwhile, others are studying themes from "Six" and will attend a performance of that show in May.
- High school students can try their hand at teaching through a new opportunity called the Future Educators Club, a club that pairs students and teachers for shadowing experience.

#### **Technology**

- Every classroom SmartBoard in the district has been replaced with a 4K Samsung Interactive Display, which allows teachers more flexibility and opportunity to enhance student learning.
- The district continues to improve network security by enhancing systems that keep students safe online and safeguard against phishing and other malicious online
- Thanks to grant funding allocated for technology, every teacher in the district received a brandnew state-of-the-art laptop this year that is equipped with the tools they need to maintain rigorous instruction.

#### **Physical Education and Athletics**

- Gates Chili is proud to be among the first schools in Section V to offer varsity girls flag football as a new athletic program this spring.
- In physical education classes throughout the district, students participate in 12-15 units each year, including activities such as archery, swimming, gymnastics, Pickleball and disc golf.
- The athletics department is removing financial barriers by offering free clinics for many athletic programs including girls' volleyball, boys' lacrosse, girls' lacrosse, wrestling, baseball, softball, track and field, golf, tennis and swimming and diving.



#### **Health and Safety**

- Gates Chili's school nursing staff recorded more than 1,400 student physical exams since September 2022 with more than 500 of those having been performed at GC for free.
- During health classes each year, students practice evacuating a school bus using the district's specially designed safety bus, an old school bus repurposed and redesigned for emergency evacuation lessons.
- The district is beefing up security throughout the district with more security guard presence and an upcoming upgrade to cameras to provide better quality and more coverage.

#### **Arts**

- Elementary school students celebrated Music in Our Schools Month with a trip to the Auditorium Theatre to hear musicians from the Rochester Philharmonic Orchestra.
- High school musicians had the chance to work with jazz icon Tom Bones Malone before performing alongside him at Java Jazz in February of this year.
- Artists at Gates Chili elementary and middle schools brought the concept of community to life through the collaborative art project called We Are Gates Chili.



#### **Student Support**

- The district has been providing Therapeutic Crisis Intervention (TCI) training to ensure staff have the tools they need to support students' varying behavioral needs
- Gates Chili has partnered with Monroe One BOCES to provide training on supporting LGBTQIA+ learners and engaging in restorative practices.
- The district is collaborating with the University of Rochester for MAAPS, Modular Approach to Autism Programs in Schools, to further enhance practices in 6:1:1 classrooms.


# **Nazareth College collaboration gets**

#### **Professional Learning**

- This school year, the district opened the Gates Chili Professional Learning Center (GCPLC), a flexible learning space for staff to engage in their continued growth.
- More than 100 professional learning in-service courses were offered in-house to staff this school year including book studies, collegial circles, classroom technology use, engagement strategies and more.
- Since this time last year, over 130 teachers were empowered to better support the varying abilities of students thanks to the LETRS professional learning program.

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
# **Spartan Eats Summer Meals**

# **Proof of Residency**

The school district may require all persons offering to vote at the budget vote and election to provide one form of proof of residency pursuant to the Education Law §2018-C. Such form may include a driver's license, a non-driver identification card, a utility bill or a voter registration card. Upon offer of proof of residency, the school district may also require all persons offering to vote to provide their signature, printed name and address.

# **Voter Eligibility**

Anyone who is at least 18 years old, a U.S. citizen and a resident of the Gates Chili Central School District for at least 30 days prior to the Tuesday, May 16, 2023 vote, is eligible. You do not need to be registered to vote, but you must bring identification and proof of residency.

#### **Absentee Ballots**

Residents unable to vote because of disabilities, illness, travel or other reasons listed as valid under election law, may request applications for absentee ballots at Gates Chili Central School District Administration Building, 3 Spartan Way, or by calling the Gates Chili District Clerk Condenessa Brown at 247-5050 ext. 12101. Once the application is approved, an absentee ballot will be mailed or can be picked up. Completed absentee ballots must be received by the district clerk's office no later than 5 p.m. on Tuesday, May 16, 2023.
