We just worked through it all one day at a time. And maybe somewhere in the middle of it all, we discovered a little bit more about who we really are."

Huynh echoed that sentiment and said, "Find your family – not only your literal kin, but the people to whom you would give the world. Seek out what you love – not only in work, but in what you do for you. Above all, be kind to yourself."

A recording by members of the Gates Chili Advanced Treble Choir and Concert Choir was played for the graduates and the assembled dignitaries. The Gates Chili Central School District 2022- 23 school budget was approved by district residents on May 17 in an 869-403 vote.

In addition to the budget proposition, district residents approved propositions for bus purchases, the establishment of a capital reserve fund for security infrastructure, and the use of capital reserve funds for audiovisual technology equipment. Voters also selected incumbents Michael Bailey, Frank Muscato and Dr. Christine Brown Richards to serve on the Gates Chili Board of Education. They will each serve a three-year term that will end on June 30, 2024. At its reorganizational meeting on July 12, the Board of Education re-elected Jeff Pettenski as president and elected Muscato as vice president.

Clean, green machines: Gates Chili is first district in WNY to launch electric school buses

Gates Chili CSD is the first district in upstate New York to add electric school buses to its fleet. The district unveiled two new electric school buses at a ribbon-cutting ceremony on June 28, signifying a milestone in Gates Chili's sustainability journey.

"Gates Chili is proud to lead the charge on zero-emissions school buses," said Superintendent of Schools Christopher Dailey. "We're adding value for our families and taking steps to address our impact on the environment; both actions that directly reflect the Spartan Way values of respect and responsibility."

The all-electric school buses, which were manufactured by Thomas Built Buses and sold by Matthews Buses, will reduce carbon emissions and save the district money in fuel and maintenance costs. The zero-emissions school buses can go more than 100 miles per charge, and feature LED fixtures both inside and outside the bus. The buses can be charged at one of the district's two new charging stations located at the Gates Chili Transportation and Facilities Center.

The district received an approved voucher from NYSERDA to reduce the cost of the two zero-emission vehicles. The district first began exploring electric vehicles in the summer of 2020, nearly two years before the



governor's proposed legislation to shift to 100% electric school buses by 2035. The governor has also promised that NYSERDA will provide technical assistance to school districts as they navigate the transition to 100% electric buses.

"Put simply, electric vehicles give us cleaner streets making our towns a better place to be for pedestrians and cyclists," said Assistant Superintendent for Business Dr. Mitchell Ball. "This is a meaningful step in creating a healthier world for our students and community."

This May, voters approved the purchase of two additional electric school buses. These school buses will be purchased in place of conventional diesel school buses that would have been replaced on the district's regular bus replacement

Quinn awarded top transportation honors

Bus driver Donald Quinn is the Gates Chili Transportation Employee of the Year. Quinn, pictured here with Director of Transportation Matt Helmbold, has worked for the district for seven years as a driver. He received the award for his upbeat attitude, willingness to pitch in, and dedication to safety.



Capital Project Update

Event-goers at Spartan Stadium and Gates Chili High School will soon have additional parking spots to choose from! The district is adding a parking lot behind the Administration Building this summer. The lot will feature a total of 151 new parking spots and will be open for use during the fall. This lot is one of the final items remaining in the district's \$68 million capital project approved by voters in 2017.



1,000,000+ meals served!

June 1 marked the millionth free meal served by Gates Chili school nutrition team members since the COVID-19 pandemic began in March 2020!

With an anticipated return to paid meals for the 2022-23 school year, the district is switching to a new online payment collection system. Effective July 2022, Gates Chili will utilize MySchoolBucks for school meals and other payments. This system will replace MyPaymentsPlus. Families will be able to add funds for school meals to their student's accounts. More details on this switch will be shared with families in August.

Armstrong students lead fundraiser for clean drinking water

A startling revelation in science class helped to transform Neil Armstrong Elementary School's fifth-grade classes into global citizens this spring, when they helped improve the lives of students halfway around the world.

Carissa Binger, a fifth-grade teacher at Neil Armstrong, said students were shocked to learn during a science unit that less than one percent of the available water in the world is safe to drink. She explained this unit led to conversations about how our community accesses water, and research into how people around the world access and use water.

"We have water we just go over to like our sink, turn it on, but people in Uganda, they have to walk miles and miles just to drink this water that's filled with bacteria and diseases," said fifth-grader Mya W.

Ugandan Water Project is a registered non-profit based in Lima, New York. It raises funds for and installs water catchment and purification systems in communities without consistent access to potable water. When students learned about the non-profit in their own backyard, they jumped into action.

For the fifth-graders and their teachers, this was a call to action. They organized awareness and fundraising campaigns, like a loose-change collection contest and daily announcements to the school. Students organized a fundraiser walk event and doubled their initial goal by raising more than \$3,900 through in-person and online fundraising. The money raised by the students is more than the amount needed to fund a full rainwater collection system for a school in Uganda.




Dinner and music bridge generations of Spartans
